At the last minute = the latest possible time to do something

I always postpone doing my taxes and submit them at the last minute because I hate doing them.

<u>To cut someone some slack</u> = to not judge or criticize someone too strongly because of empathizing with them

• My sister is in a bad mood today, but I can cut her some slack because it must be difficult to be 8-months pregnant.

To give someone a break= the same as "to cut someone some slack"

• I didn't get perfect grades in college, but my parents gave me a break because I was also working a job at the time.
