Dialogue #1

<u>I bet (that)...</u> = to be very confident that something is true

• "I bet he'll be late as usual"

I doubt (that)... = to be very confident that something is not true

• "I doubt he'll be on time"

Must = a modal to express confidence that something is true at the moment without knowing for sure

• "Everyone is wearing heavy jackets. It must be cold outside."

What's going on = what's happening

• "I don't know what's going on"

What does the speaker confidently think is not going to happen?

I just heard that our flight is now delayed. <u>I bet</u> it's the weather. It's snowing a lot outside. <u>It's supposed to</u> keep snowing heavily for the next two hours so <u>I doubt</u> we'll be departing any time soon. I'll ask someone at the gate for more information. They <u>must</u> know <u>what's going on.</u>

<u>Answer</u>: he confidently thinks "departing any time soon" is not going to happen (from the phrase "I doubt we'll be departing any time soon")

Dialogue #2

...would be ideal = expressing a preference in an indirect way

• "If you could come here at 3pm, it would be ideal"

<u>Preferably</u> = a way of introducing your preference

"I'd like to travel somewhere, preferably a place with nice beaches"

<u>Beggars can't be choosers</u> = if you are in a desperate situation you should accept anything you are given without complaining, even if it's not exactly what you want

• I needed a car for my trip, and my brother agreed to lend me his car. It's not very big, but beggars can't be choosers"

<u>Imperative</u> = very important

• "Wearing a seatbelt is imperative for your safety"

Which factor is most important for the speaker with regard to a new job?

I'm looking for a new job these days. Something that provides 8 hours a day <u>would be ideal</u>, preferably morning and afternoon but I realize that <u>beggars can't be choosers</u>. On the other hand, a minimum salary of \$40k a year is <u>imperative</u>. I can't live on any less.

<u>Answer</u> = he thinks that a minimum salary of \$40k a year is the most important factor (from the phrase "a minimum salary of \$40k a year is imperative")

Dialogue #3

While = a conjunction to link two contrasting or opposite points

• "While I like watching sports, I don't like playing them"

To be nothing to write home about = not impressive

• "the hotel that we stayed at was nothing to write home about"

All things considered = a way to introduce an overall opinion after thinking about different factors

• "The story was kind of predictable, but the acting was very good, and it had a good ending. All things considered, I liked the movie"

<u>I'd rather</u> = a way of expressing a preference

• "I'd rather eat pizza than pasta tonight"

What was the speaker not impressed with at the restaurant?

We tried the new Italian restaurant that opened on fourth street. While the interior design was nice and the service was better than average, the food was nothing to write home about compared to the delicious cuisine I was expecting for their prices. All things considered, I'd rather go elsewhere next time we want Italian.

<u>Answer</u>: he was not impressed with the food (from the phrase "the food was nothing to write home about")
